Sunday-Tuesday 2/10-2/12/13

Two-nights away in Yachats. Think winter waves, harbor seals, and migrating whales. Cape Perpetua Scenic Area to the south has paved hiking trails throughout ancient forests & unique water features. If you enjoy Bing/Google images, check out Devil's Churn, Cook's Chasm or Thor's Well to see some highlights. As for Heceta Head Lighthouse, it seems that the lovely tarp and scaffolding have been removed, but the light isn't working yet.

Modest lodging is available at Silver Surf Motel, a mile and a half north of Yachats. There are oceanfront rooms at \$79.00 per night. All of these rooms have kitchenettes, private balconies and fireplaces. Petfriendly rooms are on the first floor and require an additional fee. The first floor is 10 feet off the ground, so you would still get nice ocean views.

Two-bedroom cabins with wood-burning fireplaces and kitchen are available at \$129 per night (no view) or \$159 (with view).

Best Western Plus Agate Beach Inn offers hillside or oceanfront rooms under \$100/night with AAA/ AARP discounts. Each room has a microwave & mini-fridge. There are a couple pet-friendly rooms, if needed. Internet, Wifi & luxurious indoor pool.

William Mortensen

William Mortensen was despised and loved in his lifetime. The fine art Photography community dispised his work because it was not straight photography. Those members of the F/64 esthetic not only dismissed Mortensen's work they vilified the man as well. There was little sympathy for a photographer that worked outside the esthetic norms. The camera club and pictorial groups loved his work because it was sentimental and very pictorial in nature. His work could be quite bizarre and



walked the edge of what was considered decent in the 1930's.

His depiction of "Human Relations", on the left, was quite controversial and may have been his message to his detractors.

His manipulation of the print was a primary factor in the hostility toward his work. He was a tireless experimentor and developed methods of taking a print to heights not seen before. His technique, although quite complicated and difficult, revolved around using graphite, and various tools including but not limited to; erasers, razor blades and etching tools.

His result, many times, was not unlike what today we achieve by the use of HDR. He was able to take a print beyond the tonal range of the negative and even beyond what could be achieved by the zone system.

William Mortensen believed that there was no place in photography for highlights or shadows without detail. He felt that black areas of an image were distracting as well as white areas without detail.

It was these opinions and the subsequent results he obtained that put him on the outside of the fine art photography community. It was these very things that endeared him to the camera club community.

William Mortensen died mostly in obscurity due to the tireless efforts of Ansel Adams and Beaumont Newhall. They tried to get the Center for Creative Photogaphy to dismiss Mortensen's work out of hand. Thankfully the center was more broad mined and his work is not lost altogether. Much of Mortensen's negative archive is lost to humanity all that remains are the prints.


The man himself may not be as well know today due to the bias of a few, and I think that is sad.



A book review


LOOKING AT PHOTOGRAPHS


